

Pacific Coast Borax – Ryan Ore Gathering Tramway – aka, the Baby Gage Locomotives and rolling stock

As an unregulated tramway, there were no regulatory records of the railroad's equipment. As an adjunct to the mining operations, the railroad was not listed in Poor's Railroad manuals. As a result, the information below should be considered notes rather than a comprehensive roster.

Locomotives

Early locomotives

Chappell says the earliest locomotive(s) were built by Milwaukee. A photograph of Milwaukee locomotive No 2 appears in *Railroads of Death Valley*, p. 20. The number 2 on this locomotive suggest that there were at least two. A Milwaukee locomotive of similar design appears in a photograph of the Pacific Coast Borax owned Gerstley mine at Shashone, and may have been transferred there from Ryan after arrival of the Plymouths.

Later Locomotives

Plymouth AL-1, c/n 77, 1/5/1916, 3 tons, friction drive, Continental N3.5 engine

Plymouth AL-1 c/n 106, 4/21/1916, 3 tons, friction drive, Continental N3.5 engine

Note: one of the two AL's is on display at Furnace Creek Ranch Museum. A mucker, built on a Plymouth locomotive frame is also found in their collection, likely the second AL.

Plymouth BL-4 c/n 1584, 10/23/1923, 6 tons, friction drive, Buda BTU engine At Ryan operable

A small battery locomotive, numbered 2 appears in photos of tourist service. (Possibly transferred from the PCB mine at Boron) At least one photo identifies the locomotive as a Macha

A small battery electric locomotive is reportedly at Ryan today, believed to have originally operated at Gerstley, then at Boron.

Cars

Ore cars – At least two styles are seen in photos, low iron tip cars with a flat bottom, and gable bottom cars, likely built by Koppel, one of which is on display with the Plymouth AL at Furnace Creek

4 wheel Flat cars – to haul mine timbers and supplies

Passenger cars - (for tourist service) 4 with H&K seats salvaged from DV or T&T passenger cars, one with metal framed seats. Photos also show passengers in flat bottomed ore cars. At least one car still on site at Ryan.
